The Kasanka Trust welcomes Fellows to visit the project areas and enjoy the facilities operating in Kasanka National Park, Lavushi Manda National Park and Shoebill Camp in the Bangweulu Wetlands.

Kasanka National Park is the perfect retreat for a memorable bush experience. Game drives, walking safaris and boat rides guide visitors through a remarkable diversity of landscapes offering close up encounters of the fascinating flora and fauna. The hospitable staff and scenic accommodation combine to make Kasanka a destination for a revitalizing retreat.

From October to December at dawn and dusk, the skies are brought to life by the foraging flight of ten million fruit bats; this is acknowledged as one of the world's greatest nature spectacles and attracts visitors from around the world. Despite its modest size as a park, Kasanka has exceptional birdlife with over 470 species recorded.



The Kasanka Trust also manages the nearby Lavushi Manda National Park, allowing Fellows to trek through the stunning scenery and be amongst the first to explore this little-known wilderness.

150 kilometers to the north of Kasanka, Shoebill Island camp is situated in the heart of an extraordinary wildlife area known as the Bangweulu Wetlands. The Kasanka Trust is privileged to operate this camp as the only tourist accommodation in the area, and has supported conservation here for over 20 years. From Shoebill Island, you will set off by boat or foot to spot the elusive Shoebill amongst a plethora of local birdlife. Game drives are also offered to take you past herds of endemic Black Lechwe numbering in the tens of thousands, as well as Tsessebe, Oribi and a range of other wildlife.

SHOEBILL FELLOWS

Make a one time donation of \$5,000. The Trust offers you 30 free selfcatering bed-nights or a 40% discount on 30 fully inclusive bed-nights every year. A \$250 annual subscription is payable beginning the 3rd year of membership



WATTLED CRANE FELLOWS

Make a donation of \$3,000 and receive 20 free self-catering, or 30% discounted fully inclusive bed-nights. Subscription of \$200 from the $3^{\rm rd}$ year.



FISHING OWL FELLOWS

Donate \$1,500 for 15 free self-catering or 20% discounted fully inclusive bed nights with a \$150 subscription from the 3^{rd} year.

- Your concessions renew each calendar year and may be used by immediate family members and accompanying guests.
- Park fees and bed levies payable separately to ZAWA
- Availability may be restricted in bat season at Kasanka.
- The annual subscription forms a contribution to maintenance and recurrent costs and is required to keep your Fellowship current. Subscriptions will be reviewed annually in line with inflation, but will only be requested starting from the third calendar year of your fellowship. i.e. Join in 2015 and first subscription will be due in 2017.
